Part 1: Learning the basics

Part 3: Political Debates

A big part of the Politics A-level is considering different debates surrounding politics in this country and the US, weighing up the different arguments and coming to a conclusion.

Your task is to create a well presented poster, considering both sides to a political debate. It must include:

- Both (or multiple) sides to the argument
- Up to date evidence to help support your points
- A conclusion summarising what you think overall
- Pictures and colour to make it eye-catching and well presented

The debate you could focus on could be one of the following, or another relevant example:

- Social media and the internet is good for democracy
- It was wrong for people to try to ban Donald Trump entering the country
- > 16 and 17 year olds should be able to vote in general elections
- Voting should be made compulsory
- Referendums are good for democracy
- First Past the Post is the best ideal voting system for the UK
- The media have too much influence on who wins elections

> The only Political Parties that ever have an real power in the UK Parliament are Labour and Conservatives

All of these will need some research, some more than others. Feel free to choose a different political debate if you wish.

An example of what you need to do

If for example you chose to do 'Social media is good for democracy' you would need to consider arguments in favour (it's an easy form of participation) and against (it often has little real impact). You will need a number of arguments clearly explained on each side.

You need evidence/examples to support your points – to show that it has little impact you could refer to the petition for a second Brexit referendum which was signed by many, debated by Parliament but nothing came of it.

You then need to a conclusion – 'Overall, social media is good for democracy. This is because....' It's best to show why you have come to this conclusion by showing why the positives outweigh the negatives (or vice versa).

The purpose of the task

This task will help prepare you for the A-level in a number of ways:

- ✓ Prepares you for planning essay questions for exams
- ✓ Introduces you to a number of different political debates
- Practice in backing up your points with evidence
- ✓ Develop your ability to conduct research
- Good practice for keeping up with current affairs.

The work will be marked on the basis of the quality of the different arguments, research conducted, evidence provided, conclusion made and the presentation.
